Gathering New Apps Idea: A New Approach

Our app collection (above) came from many terrific sources including momswithapps.com, slpsharing.com, ASHA List 16 suggestions, and our current PCSS clinicians. There is another AWESOME way to collect apps that we have recently discovered, and hope that YOU will help build this library.

Here's how it works. Go to your iTunes account from your pc or mac and click on the application "Story Patch." By now, most of us know to scroll down the reviews of an app to get more information. Did you know that you can click on a reviewer's name to see what else they have reviewed? If you notice, the second review down on Story Patch identifies the writer as Nia, an SLP! I was intrigued, so I clicked on Nia's name. Guess what! Eight pages of reviews from the lovely and insightful Nia on applications she uses in speech therapy!

What Advice Would You Give a New Clinician?

Our staffing department is busily preparing for the Fall and interviewing many EXCELLENT clinical fellows and seasoned professionals. We recently polled some of our star supervisors and clinicians with the question:

What advice would you give to a beginning clinician starting in a school environment? Here are some quick answers:

1. Start the year by making friends with the custodian and secretaries, and of course the special education team. Chocolate works well. Remember, the beginning of the year is very intense, so be patient.
2. Bone up before you start on organization strategies for data collection, work flow, etc. If your district uses SEIS or another online system, try to do an online tutorial before the school year starts. Although your code will probably not work until the first or second week of school, if allowed, borrow your supervisor's password to watch the tutorial and get familiar with the software.
3. Ask the RSP and SDC teachers which parents will present the most concerns, and what they are. With the case carrier's approval, call these parents on the first day of school. "Just wanted to introduce myself. How did the summer go? We should be starting therapy soon, but I wanted to touch base with you now so that you knew my name and contact information." Proactive conversation pays off!
4. Remember that difficult teachers, and difficult parents, often have legitimate concerns based in reality from past experience. Respect them, and listen to them. Assume that hard work and focus will pay off. However, if they are asking you to do something out of the norm (e.g. observe a session) check with your team before responding. You can always say "I am new - let me check with my supervisor and get back to you."
5. Consider reviewing our prior newsletter articles on grieving and IEPs, the Communication Cake, and organization. These three articles are the most recommended to newbies.
